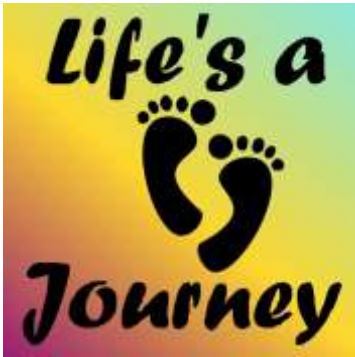

A Welcome from your new Treasurer



I wish to thank everyone for their support during my first two months as Treasurer. It is a privilege to be able to support the Church in this role. Steven's hard work over a number of years has made the transition a lot less painful than I anticipated. I know there are still many annual accounting procedures I have yet to encounter, so Steven's telephone number will stay in my

'favourites' list for some time yet!

Finance is always a thorny subject in any organisation, however big or small, and there are probably as many different opinions about it as there are people involved. I have only been a member of Bamford Chapel and Norden URC for a short time relative to many, but delving a little way back I can see that funding the running of Chapel has been an ongoing dilemma. I recently saw a leaflet produced by David Edmonds when he was Treasurer explaining a similar situation that we have now. The acronym T. R. I. O. - The Responsibility Is Ours, has frequently been mentioned at meetings I have attended. I think to summarise this, we are indebted to our Church forebears for the present strength of Chapel, and we must strive to pass on a strong Chapel to future generations.

Chapel is in a fortunate financial position but, and it is a big but, in general monthly expenditure exceeds income. To quote Charles Dickens: 'Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen pounds, nineteen and six, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds, nought and six, result misery.' (Ask me if you need it converted to decimal!).

This puts the Elders in a difficult position as they have a LEGAL responsibility to run Bamford Chapel on a sustainable footing.

We need to spread God's word and grow; that is our mission. Wouldn't it be great to task the Eldership with seeking out ways to invest Chapel resources to further reach out, rather than looking over their shoulders at a likely, dwindling reserve?

If anyone has a suggestion for an event or activity to generate income, please speak to any Elder; rest assured you won't just be told 'great, go ahead and you organise it'. I think BC & N is a fantastic Church. We need to let more people know.

Church in the World Group Update



For the first time in over 30 years the Developing World Project was launched at a different time of year, instead of around Harvest time it ran up until Christmas Day. The Project was launched on Sunday 19th February and ran for the period of Lent, with the last day of personal giving being Easter Sunday.

This year we supported Embrace the Middle East, supporting women in the poorest parts of Egypt to learn the skills to earn a sustainable living. We are grateful to Su McLellan who works for Embrace. She visited us to talk about the charities work in 2022 and more recently at the Project Launch she inspired the group members and congregation.

Through personal giving and money donated from events, including the "Famous Brownie Coffee Evening", we have raised the fantastic amount of £4,400 inclusive of gift aid monies.

See below a "thank you" from Su on behalf of Embrace.

We may often hear the phrase "Be the change you want to see in the world". The phrase is often mistakenly attributed to Gandhi, but whoever first coined it was clearly trying to get across the fact that change starts with us. The generosity that you, as a church community, have shown to the women of Egypt over your Lent appeal has been amazing and will enable real change to happen for some of the most vulnerable women in the country.

An example of where your money will go, is the Sorteira project, based at the Anafora Retreat Centre, between Cairo and Alexandria. The project is

currently working with 162 women from poor villages, where opportunities for women are almost non-existent. The project helps to build their self-confidence, improves their literacy skills and trains them to become agents of change in their own communities.

Many of the women have suffered terrible trauma, and the coaches and counsellors at the centre support and help them come to terms with what has happened to them, so that they can move on with their lives. But of course, the women don't live in isolation. So, the project has also worked with 112 men to challenge prejudice and inappropriate behaviour.

Along with other Embrace partners in Egypt, the Sorteria programme is transforming lives and communities. Thank you being part of the change we want to see in the world.

Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar. What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Put Jesus at the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest in the world:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words: *'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.'* (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously.

We should be careful not to dismiss the things that don't follow our expectations, because Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we let Him, He can do it through us!

We've zoomed, watched recorded services and received service sheets by post. We've also had some amazing Communion celebrations together.

Lots of folks have been back to Sunday worship and meetings for some time, others afraid and uncertain. After all, it is comfortable watching worship in an armchair with a cup of coffee and a slice of toast. No matter how safe we feel some of our church family still can't come due to health concerns.

We were reluctant to return till given the ok from my neurologist. So now let's wake up, what were we missing?

We are part of a family, a community of needs..... we learn , we seek, we pray together to build up our relationship with God and with other human beings. God made us to be together and not to live in isolation.



Many years ago Jeff Yates taught us the song 'I am the church, You are the church, We are the church together.' Each of us has different gifts to offer to Church. From making coffee, praying , leading worship etc etc, we are all as important in God's kingdom as the person who sits quietly next to us or sits at home alone.

Ken spoke in one of his sermons about the one constant; as disciples of God we are called to carry out the work of The Trinity. Being together, hearing God's word, reading the Bible, praying and singing hymns is so much more encouraging together, encouraging passers by to feel tempted to enter in.

God still hears us but do we feel the same encouragement and lift of the spirit in isolation?

Ken also spoke in a recent sermon of times of doubt and that's also ok. It can happen even in a crowd. The disciples had times of doubt. God will hear us all.

It's good to be back even if we seem a little cautious. When we stay home, we can still listen and join in worship. But there are many ways we simply can't serve, encourage or build up Christ's body unless we're physically present.

It's good to be back.

Guide Dogs for the Blind



On 8th June Freda Farnworth came to speak to Ladies Fellowship about the charity organisation Guide Dogs for the Blind, and its training of guide dogs. The puppies are socialised in a Puppy Raiser's family home until they are about 18 months old and then begin their specialist training. This takes many months of patient handling with the trainer and the blind person.

The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association have their own kennels in the south, where the puppies are bred and trained. The cost of breeding, training and keeping one puppy over its lifetime is around £84,000, which is covered by the association. When the dogs have finished their working life they are rehomed with families or they may stay with their owner.

Obituary on the Passing of Common Sense

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved friend, **Common Sense**, who has been with us for many years. No-one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain
- Why the early bird catches the worm
- Life isn't always fair
- And maybe it was my fault



Common Sense lived by simple, sound, financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6-year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children. It declined even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student, but could not inform parents when a student become pregnant and wanted to have an abortion.

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims.

Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to

realise that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap and was promptly awarded a huge settlement.

Common Sense was preceded in death;

- By his parents, Truth and Trust
- By his wife, Discretion
- By his daughter, Responsibility
- And by his son, Reason

Common Sense is survived by his 5 stepbrothers;

- I know my rights
- I want it now
- Someone else is to blame
- I'm a victim
- Pay me for doing nothing

Not many attended his funeral because so few realised he was gone.

If you still remember him, pass this on. If not, join the majority and do nothing.

15th July - St Swithun (or Swithin) Saint for a rainy day



St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

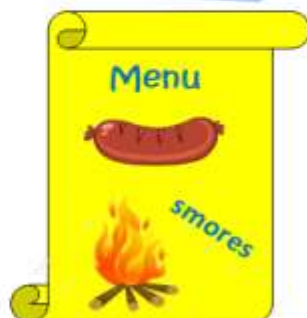

Thoughts from a Holiday

In early June this year we spent a gloriously sunny week in Rock, on the north coast of Cornwall. I felt so blessed to be able to enjoy some of my greatest pleasures in life - spending quality time with our family, walking (as far as I am now able) the beautiful Cornish coastline and everywhere surrounded by a myriad of wild flowers of every colour in the lanes, hedges and coastal paths, buzzing with bees and butterflies. I ran out of superlatives, marvelling at God's wonderful creation.

On one of our walks we visited the little church of St Enerdoc in the parish of St Minver, with its crooked spire, nestling in the dunes above Daymer bay. It is only accessible on foot, a 10 minute walk across the golf course from the nearest road. Why this lovely chapel is there is a mystery. There is no doubt that it was an ancient place of worship, as some of the architecture can be traced back to the 12th century, but for many years it was buried in the sand and was presumably recovered and beautifully renovated in 1864. There had obviously been a very recent wedding there on our visit, and the doorway and inside screen were beautifully decorated with real white flowers.

The poet laureate, John Betjeman was particularly fond of the church and the area, and he lies buried in the churchyard. His poem 'Sunday afternoon service at St Enodoc church' is written in his evocative style, and is too long to print here, but is well worth a read. In the church pictured here we found this leaflet about the Lord's Prayer called "What does it mean to you", which I found humbling and challenging.



Maybe it will help us all to think more about the familiar words we say in the service each Sunday.

What does it mean to you?

Our Father who art in Heaven

Don't say "Father" if you don't behave like a son or a daughter. Don't say "Our" if you only ever think of yourself

Hallowed be thy Name

Don't say "Hallowed" if you don't honour that name

Thy Kingdom come

Don't say "Thy Kingdom come" if you are weighed down only with material considerations

Thy will be done

Don't say "Thy will be done" if you don't accept the hard bits

On earth as it is in Heaven

Don't say "As it is in Heaven" if you only ever think about earthly matters

Give us this day our daily bread

Don't say "Our daily bread" if you have no concern for the hungry or the homeless

Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us

Don't say "Forgive us our trespasses" if you remain angry with your fellows

Coffee, cake, and chat
