Letter from the Other Manse

Dear All,



Over the last few months, I have been attending an online group which has been doing a Bible study using the famous 12 Steps to Recovery. Created by Bill Wilson in the 1930s, the 12 Steps synonymous with Alcoholics are Anonymous. Of interest, Wilson's 12 Steps originated in his membership with a Christian fellowship, called the Oxford Group, of which he was a member from 1932-33. The Oxford Group's most

important teachings focussed on absolute honesty, purity, unselfishness and love. This inspired Wilson to form the programme for recovery that we know as the 12 Steps.

We often think of the "big ticket" items when we consider addictions including alcoholism, drugs misuse, gambling and the like. I had a brush with alcohol dependency back in my 20s, and some of our group's members have enjoyed sobriety for over a decade. However, there are many hidden and more socially acceptable addictions that we all carry. And God wants to draw our attention to these "minor" dependencies, as well as the more destructive addictions, which draw our lives away from God.

The 12th Step says: "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we try to carry this message to others and to practise these principles in our lives." The Life Recovery Bible links 1 Timothy 4.14-16 with this 12th Step:

"Do not neglect your gift, which was given you through prophecy when the body of elders laid their hands on you. Be diligent in these matters; give yourself wholly to them, so that everyone may see your progress. Watch your life and doctrine closely. Persevere in them, because if you do, you will save both yourself and your hearers."

As we all know, a relationship with God is exactly that - a relationship - which is a gift rather than the result of jumping through spiritual hoops. However, it is from this relationship that we live out our faith in practical terms. This has led some of my friends towards freedom from alcohol misuse, and they tell their story to other addicts that they can know freedom in God. Likewise, we can name our own unhealthy dependencies and compulsive behaviours (the 4th Step), walking towards freedom in God, and tell our own stories of recovery of life.

How Climate Change could affect your Cup of Tea

Now here's something that will send you straight to your kitchen to put the kettle on: the Great British cup of tea may not taste quite so good in the future.

It seems that extreme weather and rising temperatures could lead to inferior leaves in the future, according to Christian Aid.

Kenya, the world's foremost exporter of black tea, is now affected by erratic rainfall, floods, droughts, and rising temperatures. India, Sri Lanka and China, also major tea producers, face climate change problems as well.



Climate change has been predicted by some as likely to cut production in Kenya's best teamaking areas by as much as a quarter by 2050. Even areas of only average growing conditions could see production fall by 39 per cent.

As one tea farmer in Kenya's Western Highlands, explained: "We cannot predict seasons anymore. Temperatures are rising,

rainfall is erratic, often accompanied by unusual hailstones and longer droughts. If this continues, it will make growing tea much harder."

Bamford Chapel and Norden United Reformed Church: Developing World Project 2021



It feels like the 2021 Project has come along very quickly, following finishing our giving to the Kiribati School for Children with Additional needs. As always, the Church in the World Group has considered a range of projects and Medic Malawi has been recommended and approved by the Elders and Church Meeting.

We warmly invite you all to the launch of Project 2021 on Sunday 12th September. Sian Howell-Jones one of Medic Malawi's Trustees will join us to bring to life the work of the charity and explain what our giving will be used for.

Following worship, we are holding a lunch, the menu will be baked potatoes and a variety of fillings, with fruit to follow. If you would like to have lunch, please can you contact Carole Greaves or Rebecca Abbott, just so that we have numbers for catering purposes and a note of any dietary requirements.

Medic Malawi has been on our radar as a project choice since 2015 when Mike Lucas first suggested it. At that time we felt that another project needed our input more, however we seem to have been steered again towards this very needy community.

Malawi is a very poor nation reliant on agriculture which employs nearly 80% of the population. There is a lot of disease evidenced by high levels of child and adult mortality and high prevalence of diseases such as malaria, HIV/AIDS etc.

Medic Malawi is a small UK based Charity with a vision of "A Malawi where everyone has the opportunity to thrive".

Medic Malawi was set up in 2001 and provides support to some of the

world's most deprived people. There are two main elements to the support Medic Malawi provides in rural Malawi:

- St. Andrew's Hospital, Mtunthama, providing both financial and practical support. The hospital was set up in 2001 and has had a key role in treating people with COVID-19 during 2020/21.
- Chalizya School, Chimbiya Village; support to the school started in 2011. Medic Malawi volunteers have worked with local people to build classrooms and help to run the school, including setting up child care programmes, menstrual health projects to increase school attendance, provision of support and accommodation for teachers to encourage teachers to work in the school etc. The school has around 640 children on role.

Specific areas where Medic Malawi have identified help is needed most:

We have met with the Director and one of the Trustees on zoom and had email exchanges. The Trustees have recommended the following; this is an evolving conversation with the Trustees; by the Project Launch date in September we will hope to have specific priorities with costings.

- Developing rooms within the school for use by staff for local community groups
- Improve flooring; current floors are covered in rubble
- Developing solar power for the school including lighting, so that the school can be used out of daylight hours
- Installation of improved water sources
- Rain water collection and control; working towards use of water for sustainable crop development
- Continued menstrual health project
- New doors to improve security
- Outdoor shelters

Sustainability:

Medic Malawi work closely with local people and have recently appointed a local manager to involve the community. The community have already been very active in working on practical projects with Director Tom Hunt, who has recently completed a 6-month stint in Malawi to assist with various projects. Both the hospital and school projects have been operating for a long time in Malawi under the direction of Medic Malawi in partnership with local people. Improved education will support children to have a better chance of breaking the cycle of poor health and poverty.



I hope that this inspires you to join us for worship on 12th September to hear more about the project.

Recycling News



Several "hyper-targeted" billboards have gone up outside Tesco, M&S and Sainsbury's stores, informing shoppers Co-op stores now accept soft plastics like crisp packets and bread bags, no matter where they were bought.

Earlier this month, Co-op rolled out soft plastic recycling units to 1,500 stores following a small trial in September. The units will be available at 2,300 Co-op stores by November.

When it comes to doing good, everyone's welcome at Co-op. So, in the spirit of co-operation, we put our ads outside competitors' stores to show that even if you shop somewhere else, you can now recycle your soft plastics at the Co-op.

Soft plastics recycling is easy. Just follow these three steps:

- Clean it First, rinse your packaging out.
- Scrunch it If it pings back, it's a useful indicator it's soft plastic.
- Co-op it Pop it into our soft plastics recycling unit at a Co-op near you.

What are soft plastics?

- Soft plastics are lightweight plastics that often cannot be placed in recycling bins at home. Think plastic film lids on yoghurt pots, soft fruit punnets and ready meals, as well as plastic crisp packets, pasta bags and chocolate or biscuit wrappers.
- What they're not are plastic bottles, tubs, pots, trays and caps. If you're not sure, a simple test is to scrunch it up and if it pings back, it's a useful indicator it's soft plastic.

The Norden and Cutgate branches have recycling bins.

Thanking God for our Blessings



Our winter barley ripened quickly this year, and soon the combine harvesters were rolling here on the Northumberland / Scottish Border.

As the first trailer load of grain came into the shed, I ran my hands through the golden grains, offering a short prayer of thankfulness as I savoured the smell of fresh cut barley. It was a good harvest.

I've often reflected on the Old Testament festival of the Firstfruits, where the Israelites offered the very first sheaf of the spring harvest to God (*Leviticus 23:9-14*). I think this act required great faith, as they trusted God for a fruitful harvest to come, something that was far from certain, given their utter dependence on the weather.

I'm not sure about you, but I'm always up for giving thanks *after* the event. I'll sing 'Come ye thankful people come' and rejoice that "all is safely gathered in", but am I able to trust with anticipation for what is yet to come?

The festival of the Firstfruits reminded God's people that everything they had came from Him. I am reminded that I must learn (and relearn) to trust in God, who has proven His faithfulness to me, over and over again.

Perhaps right now as a church community or an individual you're waiting for a certain event, standing on the cusp of a new initiative, praying for a certain outcome or anticipating a long-held vision becoming reality. Let's all keep trusting that whatever the challenge, however things turn out, irrespective of what we anticipate, God is going before us and has secured the Firstfruits of an even greater harvest through Jesus, as He rose from the dead.

Just as the grain offering to God in the Old Testament anticipated a harvest to come, Paul reminds us that Jesus' victory anticipates an even greater bodily resurrection and eternal peace (**1** Corinthians 15:20-22).

As we continue our journey with Jesus through the challenges of each day, let's do so with a deepening faith and trust. In the meantime, bring on the harvest - I'll see you on the other side!

All in the month of SEPTEMBER

It was:

700 years ago, on 13th Sept 1321 that Dante Alighieri, Italian poet, died. Regarded as the most important poet of the Middle Ages. Best known for his *Divine Comedy*.

125 years ago, on 24th Sept 1896 that F Scott Fitzgerald, American novelist and short story writer, was born. Regarded as one of the greatest American writers of the 20th century. Best known for his novel *The Great Gatsby.*

100 years ago, on 8th Sept 1921 that Sir Harry Secombe was born. This Welsh comedian, actor, writer, singer and TV presenter was one of the stars of the 1950s radio series *The Goon Show.*

80 years ago, on 1st Sept 1941 that Nazi Germany ordered all Jews in Germany and its occupied territories to wear a yellow Star of David badge.

75 years ago, from 20^{th} Sept – 5^{th} Oct 1946 that the first Cannes Film Festival was held.

65 years ago, on 16th Sept 1956 that Play-Doh went on sale in the USA. It was originally sold as a wallpaper cleaning compound, but was then relaunched as a modelling compound when the inventor's nephew discovered that nursery school children were using it to make Christmas ornaments.

60 years ago, on 11th Sept 1961 that the World Wildlife Fund (now the World Wide Fund for Nature) was founded in Switzerland.

50 years ago, on 15th Sept 1971 that Greenpeace, the international environmental group, was founded in Vancouver.

25 years ago, on 27th Sept 1996, that the Taliban seized control of Kabul, Afghanistan, ousting President Burhanuddin Rabbani, and executing former President Mohammad Najibullah.

20 years ago, on 11th Sept 2001, that the 9/11 terrorist attack on the USA took place. 2,973 people were killed.

The Parable of the Sower

This month we are looking at the Parable of the Sower (*Mark 4*:1-20). It's the story of a farmer who sowed his seed in different type of soils. These represent the different responses of the heart to God's Word (*v*15-20):

1) The hard heart: 'like seed along the path... as soon as they hear it, Satan comes and takes away the word that was sown in them.' (15). Some people, when they hear the message, get distracted eg social media, work or relationships. Personal priorities prevent them from hearing God.



2) The shallow heart: 'like seed sown on rocky places... since they have no root, they last only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away.' (16,17). These are the people whose heart isn't open to the message. When things become uncomfortable or discouraging, they are ready to quit.

3) The crowded heart: 'like seed sown among thorns... but the worries of this life, the deceitfulness of wealth and the desires for other things come in and choke the word, making it unfruitful.' (18,19). This soil is most relevant for us today. People crave status, comfort, security and personal desires alongside the things of God. It's a heart that is worried about life getting out of control!

4) The open heart: 'like seed sown on good soil, hear the word, accept it, and produce a crop – some thirty, some sixty, some a hundred times what was sown.' (20). This represents the open heart that listens and accepts Jesus's word, and is ready to follow Him however difficult things become.

What kind of soil is our heart? Are we hard, shallow, crowded or open? Do we have a heart of faith to follow Jesus in every aspect of our lives?
