Step 4 of Boris Johnson's "Roadmap out of Lockdown" has been extended from 21 June 2021 for up to another 4

weeks, due to an increase in the "Delta" Indian Covid variant.

Covid Vaccine rollout is continuing at pace and over 18s are now being invited. Numbers of positive cases, hospital admissions & deaths are coming down, although there is still concern in some areas about Covid variants, particularly the Indian variant. Further information is available on the Government website and Rochdale Council website.

Step 4 will allow limits on social contact to be removed, nightclubs can reopen and restrictions on large events and performances will be lifted.

At present all church activities are suspended. The Sunday worship service is still available on YouTube and on the church website (www.bcnchurch.org.uk) and in printed email form.

Unless infection rates change; or government advice changes, we will continue opening for worship at Bamford Chapel & Norden URC on Sunday mornings at 10.30 am.

We will continue to limit the congregation to 30, for the time being. People wishing to attend can text or phone the church mobile number to book a place.

People are asked to phone on a Thursday evening between 6 & 8pm ideally.



This month should see the start of the Tokyo Olympics, having been postponed from last year due to the Coronavirus pandemic. A number of New Testament letters refer to Olympic sport including Hebrews: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (Hebrews 12:1-2).

The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race, but despite the struggles and obstacles, there is a great crowd of witnesses cheering us on. We have a heavenly Father who loves us and a Saviour who has run the race before us. If we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, He will enable us to finish the race.



During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the semi-finals of the 400 metres. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore. He fell to the ground in pain and stretcher bearers came over to him.

However, Redmond was determined to finish the race and so he started hopping toward the finishing line. Suddenly Jim Redmond, Derek's father, ran out of the stands towards him. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek, to which his father said, "We're going to finish this together." They completed the lap with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder. As they crossed the finish line, the spectators rose to give Derek a standing ovation. Although he didn't win an Olympic medal, Derek Redmond finished the race with his father at his side. Let's not forget the encouragement we have to finish the race!




Dear all,

COMMUNITY COFFEE MORNING





Classic Summer Pudding



You will need:

300g raspberry 225g blackberry 100 redcurrant 400g strawberry, hulled and quartered 40g golden caster sugar

400g brioche loaf

Wash the fruit and place it all (except the strawberries) in a large pan with the sugar and 3tbsp water. Gently heat for three minutes until the juice starts to run. Add the strawberries and cook for two minutes.

Slice the brioche into 1cm thick slices and line a pudding basin.

Tip the fruit into the basin and cover with a layer of brioche.

Place a small plate snugly over the basin and weigh down with 2 x 400g of beans or tomatoes. Leave in the fridge for at least a couple of hours. **Flip** the pudding over onto a plate to serve with cream or ice cream.



How to Live a Greener Life

We are bombarded with reports and news stories about pollution, wildlife declines, climate change and other environmental

concerns, but as individuals we can often feel daunted and helpless about what we can do. Everyone - if they want to - can do their bit in small but meaningful ways and often save money. Here is this month's tip to help you.

Don't flush away plastics, wet wipes and phosphates. Trillions of tiny pieces of plastic accumulate in the world's oceans, lakes and estuaries, harming marine life and entering the food chain. Upto 219,000 tonnes of microplastics enter European waters every year and have been found on sea beds and in Arctic Ice. Much of this comes from products flushed down plug holes and toilets, such as wet wipes and the microbeads

found in many skincare products. Try to use scrubs and peels with sand, salt or coconut, rather than plastic particles. Washing up liquids and detergents containing phosphates behave like fertilisers in water, encouraging algal blooms (a rapid growth of microscopic algae or cyanobacteria in water, often resulting in a coloured scum on the surface) that suffocate aquatic life.

Lady Diana Spencer – later Princess of Wales – was born 60 years ago on 1st July 1961 at Sandringham in Norfolk. Twenty years later, on 29th July 1981, she married Prince Charles at St Paul's Cathedral in London. She died in a car crash in Paris in 1997.

Diana was not an academic child, but concentrated on art, music and sport. She was widely admired for her beauty and style, and during her time as Princess of Wales achieved a great

deal in her charity work, particularly in the unexpected areas of AIDS and landmines. Partly because of this she was believed to have strong Christian beliefs, but this is not something she spoke about, though a special episode of *Songs of Praise* on the BBC saw it as the motive for her charity work.

Her marriage to Charles suffered because of their obvious incompatibility and their affairs. They separated in 1992 and divorced in 1996. Their two sons, William and Harry, suffered as a result and have reacted in markedly different ways.

Diana was the first Englishwoman for more than 300 years to marry the heir to the throne. She was also the first royal bride to have a paying job before her engagement.

Donkeys recruited to help save Wildflowers

Many of you will know of my love of donkeys. I sponsor one every year in the name of my eldest granddaughter. Tiny Tim is our donkey this year and he lives at a sanctuary in Manchester. We hope to be able to visit him very soon! This newspaper article caught my eye recently and I would like to share it with you.

Rescue donkeys are joining the fight to save one of the UKs rarest farmland wildflowers. The small flowered catchfly, found in field margins has disappeared from 70% of its range with the rise of intensive farming and increased use of herbicides. In an effort to revive the population of the plant, 20,000 catchfly seeds have been



sown on plots at the headquarters of The Donkey Sanctuary near Sidmouth. Next spring the donkeys will be walked over the seeded plots in a process known as "treading in". The weight from the donkey's hooves help to embed the seed into the ground which should boost the wildflower's chance of germination.
